

## Congratulations to Alamo Heights' New City Manager Buddy Kuhn

City Council is pleased to announce the new City Manager for the City of Alamo Heights is Buddy Kuhn. Buddy has been with Alamo Heights since 2009 when he was hired as Assistant Fire Chief. He was promoted to Fire Chief/Emergency Management Coordinator in 2010 and has served as Assistant City Manager/Fire Chief since 2014.

Mr. Kuhn had served as a Firefighter since 1981 spending most of his career in the City of Terrell Hills Fire Department, where he was Assistant Fire Chief for almost 10 years. His experience also includes working for the City of Boerne where, among other tasks, he served in the Fire Marshal's office as a Deputy City Fire Marshal assisting in plan reviews and code enforcement as well as commercial fire inspections.

# Don't be a Victim Be Alert!

Vehicle burglaries remain the most reported offense to the Alamo Heights Police Department even though they are the easiest to prevent. Thieves are more likely to target vehicles parked in public and private parking lots because people do not pay much attention to people who look like anyone else. Parking lots of restaurants, sporting events and dog parks seem to be more preferred target areas because vehicle owners are away from their vehicle for long periods of time. A common tactic for thieves is to "shop" cars looking for personal property left in open view within passenger compartments or the beds of trucks. A briefcase, purse, computer bag, backpack, etc., left in open view are the more targeted items. It takes only seconds to open an unlocked door or break a window to steal the property.



To prevent becoming a potential victim of multiple crimes people are urged to put all items of value in the trunks of their vehicles, take it with them or leave it at home or their office. Victims of vehicle burglaries not only experience the damage to their vehicle and loss of property but any credit cards taken during these thefts are quickly used multiple times, often before the victim knows they were stolen. Another companion crime to vehicle burglaries is identity theft. Victims of vehicle burglaries involving the loss of a purse or briefcase have found themselves trying to clear up credit accounts, bank fraud and other financial crimes committed by persons using their identity. The solution is simple; remove personal property from the passenger compartment of vehicles, lock the door and set the alarm.
