If you think, as many people do, that dog waste is a natural fertilizer, think again. Since most dogs' diets are high in protein, it has the reverse effect of fertilizer. Dog waste is exceptionally high in nitrogen and phosphorus, so if you let your dog's waste lay in your grass, it can actually cause burns in your lawn. Since it's so acidic, it will kill your grass if it isn't picked up.

Dog waste isn't the same as cow manure since cows eat plant matter. Cow manure can be used as compost in gardens and fields. In fact, dog waste can contaminate fruits, vegetables, and surrounding areas with harmful bacteria if not composted properly.

You might think that your dog's waste cannot do much harm. However, it can throw off the balance of an ecosystem, especially in heavily populated areas. An ecosystem can handle about two dogs per square mile. However, in

many cities, there are close to 125 dogs per square mile! Which is plenty to throw off an ecosystem especially if some owners are not picking up pet waste on a regular basis.
