With more people shopping on-line the delivery services will be very busy this shopping season delivering all those purchases right to your front door. If you anticipate your packages might be delivered during a time when someone will not be home to receive them it is a good idea to arrange for an alternate delivery method to avoid the opportunity for your packages to be stolen from your front porch. Voter Centers in Bexar County



During the November election, voters can vote at any Bexar County designated polling site.

Voter Center Model—with the Voter Center Model, the voter can vote at any Bexar County Election Day designated polling sites just as similar to Early Voting. Early Voting allows a voter to vote anywhere Bexar County has designated as their polling sites during Early Voting period. On Election Day, voters can vote at **any** polling site (voter center) within Bexar County. The Voter Center Model has been adopted to decrease the number of provisional ballots and provide additional convenience.

The City of Alamo Heights does not have any City-related items on the November 7th Joint Constitutional Amendments, General, Special, Charter, and Bond Election ballot; however, City Hall will be a Voter Center (polling site) on Tuesday, November 7th, Election Day from 7 a.m.—7 p.m.

Daylight Savings Time

Sunday, November 5th is the time to "fall back" and also give your smoke detectors a fresh start.

Stage 4 Water Restrictions

The City of Alamo Heights has declared Stage 4 Water Restrictions based on mandatory pumping restrictions by the Edwards Aquifer, which was effective July 24, 2023. Watering with automatic or manual irrigation systems is permitted only once EVERY OTHER week between the hours of 7am and 11am and 7pm to 11pm. The last number of your address determines what day you are able to water. The week of November 6th, 2023 is a watering week.

Winter Averaging for Sewer Fees



Reminder: your water consumption during the winter months affects your residential sewer service fee for the next year. Residential sewer service fees are calculated based on the average water usage during three consecutive billing periods. This year your November, December, and January consumption will be used for your winter averaging.

Why Scooping is Important

Picking up pet waste and disposing of it in the trash keeps our sidewalks clean and our neighbors happy. But it also protects water quality, keeping our water resources safe for drinking and swimming. Pet waste is full of bacteria that can make people sick. Rain can wash pet waste left outside into our stormwater drains which ends up in rivers, streams and even lakes.



CLEAN AFTER YOUR PET

- It is the dog owner's responsibility to clean up after their pet.
- Picking up poop helps to create a clean, sanitary play area for all.
- It prevents pet waste from being tracked indoors.



POOP IS A POLLUTANT

- 1 gram of dog poop contains 23 million fecal bacteria that carry harmful diseases and viruses.
- Rain washes dog poop into water systems, infiltrating drinking and swimming water.
- Dog poop destroys grass. Some contains E. Coli & parasite worms.



BAG IT

- Keep a supply of plastic bags with you - reuse old sandwich or bread bags or purchase special bags where pet supplies are sold.
- Use the bags to pick up the dog waste.



THROW IT IN THE GARBAGE

- Just because it's bagged does not mean it is OK to leave it on the ground.
- Don't flush it! Wastewater systems are not designed for dog poop.
- Throw it away in a pet waste station (several located around the City) or garbage can.
